You can make your vegetables tasty by roasting them and adding seasoning, writes Zoe Mak.



- 1 [1] Ask any teenager what their favourite food is and the answer is likely to be fast food, desserts and snacks. As tasty as these things may be, none of them offers much in the way of nutrition. Eating
- 5 too much of any or all of them could even cause health problems. 'I know a lot of children and adults who don't like (i) fruit and vegetables,' says Wynnie Chan, a British-trained nutritionist and Young Post health columnist. She
- 10 suggests coming up with ways to make eating fruit and vegetables more fun.

[2] 'Eat all the colours of the rainbow,' she says. 'Challenge yourself to eat fruit and veggies of different (ii) ______each day. For

15 example, make Monday a red day with watermelon, strawberries or cherries, and make Tuesday a green day with celery, kiwi or green grapes.'

[3] Ms. Chan also suggests thinking about a healthier breakfast — instead of sprinkling your

- 20 oatmeal or cereal with sugar, how about jazzing it up with fruit? She also says the way you cook vegetables makes a big difference to how they taste. 'Roasting vegetables such as peppers, carrots, onions and tomatoes makes them caramelise, so
- 25 they taste sweeter and more delicious,' she says. Roasted vegetables, like peppers, carrots, onions and tomatoes, make wonderful toppings for noodles or filling for sandwiches.

[4] A veggie soup is delicious with either noodles or
30 crusty bread. Tomatoes are a key ingredient in most vegetable soups, but be sure to ________
them first by boiling them briefly and then nicking the skins with a knife — the rest will peel off in a flash.

35 **[5]** Another way to make vegetables more fun is to cut them up into bite-sized pieces and prepare a dip of blended yoghurt and mint, seasoned with a little salt and pepper, to accompany them.

[6] If you like it spicy, try a salsa-like sauce of 40 chopped tomato, onion and chilli — and experiment with herbs like coriander and dill as seasoning. A tangy sauce goes great with salads.

[7] Laurent Andre, executive chef at the Intercontinental Hotel, suggests avoiding boiling45 vegetables unless you are using them in a soup. Cooking vegetables in water, he says, results in both the nutritional content and the tastiness of the vegetables melting away, and the vegetables becoming waterlogged. The result: tasteless

Just Like Mama Used to Make

American photographer John Ishii gives a brief account of the food served at his home in the United States.

1 [1] Next time your 13-year-old daughter or son sulks when you refuse them money for new clothes or the latest mobile phone, rest assured it really is for their own good. What makes teenagers happy, according 5 to research, are the simple things in life.

[2] Close friends, playing sport and a stable home life are more important to the happiness of children aged 10-15 than the wealth of their parents, according to a study by the Institute for Social and 10 Economic Research at the University of Essex.

[3] Other factors that increase a child's sense of well-being include a healthy lifestyle, a sense of community and good behaviour from their classmates during lessons. Researcher Gundi Knies

15 found no difference in the average life satisfaction score of children in families with lower incomes compared with those living in families with higher incomes.

[4] Access to the Internet for up to one hour a day20 boosts contentment, but excessive time spent on social media is an attribute of an unhappy child.'Children need to have access to the Internet like their friends, but when it exceeds an hour per day it prevents them from engaging in other social25 activities that would make them happier,' said Knies.

[5] Children who have friends over for tea once a fortnight and those who go swimming once a month are more likely to be happy. Factors indirectly connected to wealth also played a part in happiness.

³⁰ Children who have their own bedroom, bike or other leisure equipment are also happier. Diet, which can also be linked to wealth, also plays an important role. Children who have fewer than five portions of fruit and vegetables a day or who eat fast food most 35 days tend to be less happy.

[6] Girls make up both the happiest and least happy groups of children. Girls aged between 10 and 12 are the happiest while those aged 12–15 are the least happy. 'Older girls are unhappier because they are

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- 40 going through puberty and their parents become more protective and girls become very conscious of the way they look and the way they are treated,' said Knies. 'In general boys don't face the same pressures.'
- 45 [7] The study was based on 5000 children from families with an average monthly income of £1144. Families from the wealthiest 1% in the UK were not included in the study.

[8] Levels of poverty in Britain tend to be higher50 than in countries with a comparable wealth. A recent study found Britain was fifth in a European league table for child poverty behind Italy, Latvia, Bulgaria and Romania.

[9] At the instigation of David Cameron, the Office55 for National Statistics compiles a happiness index to complement other measures such as gross domestic product to get a picture of life in the UK, but it surveys adults and teenagers over 16.

[10] Knies said: 'There is a lot of work done
60 about the happiness of adults and there is a strong correlation between wealth and well-being.' The major difference with children is that they do not earn their own money and normally parents do not tell them how much they earn. Children can judge
65 wealth by the amount of food there is at home and by comparing standards to the homes of other children.

[11] 'I found it interesting that children value similar things to their parents, a stable setting and participation in society. The findings of this report70 suggest it is very important to ensure that children



have lots of opportunity for social contact. This could mean keeping youth clubs open; ensuring access to local amenities and sports clubs is as

effective in ensuring the well-being of children as 75 money transfers.'
